



1. Children go to school for teaching and learning. It is a special place for children for lots of different reasons. Write a list poem entitled 'My school is a special place' to explain why school is a special place for you. Use a capital letter at the start of each sentence and a full stop at the end.
2. Draw a plan of your school from memory and label the different areas, such as the hall, library and classrooms. Then choose one of these areas and circle it on your plan. Write a few sentences to explain what the area is used for and why the area is important to you.
3. It is important to care for each other and look after objects and equipment when we are in school. Think of an important message or action for how everyone should behave in school. For example, it is important to use kind and polite words with each other. Design a poster to display in school to encourage and remind children about your important action or message.
4. A timeline is a line that has important events on it in chronological order. Complete a timeline of your life. Think about the important things that have happened and when, such as being born, starting school and moving year groups.

5. The Victorian era was the time from 1837 to 1901 when Queen Victoria was the monarch of the United Kingdom. Use books and the internet to answer these questions about Queen Victoria.
